

Hertford East to Broxbourne

Embark on a voyage of Real Ale discovery on the historic New River Line









Welcome to a voyage of Real Ale discovery on the historic New River Line which has served its community for over 180 years.

The New River Line, once known as the Hertford East Branch Line, is made up of five stations, the Line itself runs in and out of London, Liverpool Street. Journey time between each station ranges from 3 to 5 minutes, with London to Hertford taking just 49 minutes.

Your Rail Ale Trail features pubs that are an easy walk from each station. A couple of pubs are a little further but are well worth the extra steps and have been recognised as worthy additions by CAMRA.

If you are a fan of real ale or simply wish to explore the area and be confident of some great stopping places, then this specially designed trail is definitely for you. An excellent choice of well-served cask ales will be available at every stop.

For those who want to explore the entire route on foot, the River Lee Towpath and The New River Path run alongside The New River Line so there are plenty of opportunities to add a walk in-between stations.

The New River Path provides an interesting route alongside the engineering marvel that is the New River, the name is a slight misnomer as it is neither New nor a River. This artificial waterway was opened in 1613 to supply London with fresh drinking water as it still does to this day. This path is not suitable for buggies, cycles or wheelchairs.

A worthwhile walk along the New River Path is between St Margarets and Ware Station as you will come upon George IV in Great Amwell, slightly uphill from the remarkable Amwell Pool created by Robert Mylne, the chief engineer of The New River Company to celebrate Sir Hugh Myddleton the creator of The New River.

The River Lea Towpath is well surfaced, so is ideal for walks at any time of the year and is suitable for those on wheels. You will be rewarded with beautiful views along the way. Each town and village along the line has its own interesting array of attractions such as historical buildings,

independent shops and nature reserves so there's plenty to see and do between pub visits.



TICKET INFORMATION


A valid ticket is required for your journey on The New River Train Line. This can be purchased in advance or you can 'tap in and out' with an Oyster Card or contactless payment methods. A return ticket will allow you to disembark the train and re-join as long as you continue in the same direction of travel.

Hertford has a rich brewing history, the barley grown in the surrounding fields was a Maltsters favourite. The other natural advantage was the River Lea. It flowed straight from the centre of the town, ran in to the Thames and directly into the heart of London, as it continues to today. Here the great brewing names such as Whitbread and Trumans built riverside warehouses to accept the continuous barges of malt.

A Free House pleasantly situated by the River Lea with plenty of outside seating. Locally sourced food is served daily. There are regular quiz nights and annual events such as the Easter Monday duck race and the mini music festival in May. There are two changing cask ales and the regular Marston's 61 Deep.



NEARLY 200 YEARS OF BREWING HERITAGE

McMullen's have been brewing in Hertford since 1827 and own around 70 pubs in Hertfordshire. Their famous AK Original Mild has a pedigree dating back to the 1830's. Look out for the regular seasonal handpumped cask beers sometimes sold under the company's Rivertown brand. The former McMullen classic Victorian tower brewery sits opposite the current brewery site in Hartham Lane. Their cask and bottled beers can be purchased online from their website or from the on-site shop (weekdays 10am-3pm).

To London, Cambridge & Stansted Airport



Built as a hotel in 1843 by the Eastern Counties Railway it served Hertford Station in its original location, until the construction of the replacement Hertford East station in the 1880's. The Tavern was purchased by McMullens in 1903 and refurbished in the 1940s. This two-bar popular local maintains a traditional feel with many interesting rail themed artifacts. McMullen AK Original plus two from the McMullen range available.

McMullen's 'Brewery Tap' is riverside, with terraced

seating, at the head of the River Lea Navigation. Brewerv artefacts adorn the the walls. Outbuildings contain games rooms for pool, darts and crazy golf. The menu specialises in a variety of burgers and pizzas. Cask beers available are McMullen AK Original, Country Best Bitter, IPA and a seasonal ale.



Historic hotel with a pedigree traceable to 1431. Refurbished in 2022, there is a large restaurant, sizable bar, an atmospheric snug room and an attractive courtyard to the rear. Open for breakfasts from 8am. There is a seasonal British menu with a modern take. Two McMullen cask ales available.

Superb town centre Free House offering a friendly welcome. Up to six real ales, including a dark beer, come from brewers large and small and there is a fine choice of Belgian bottleconditioned beers. No TV or music here, just good old-fashioned conversation. Home-made pork pies and scotch eggs are usually available.

THE WHITE HORSE 10 Minutes Walk O 33 Castle Street,

SG141HH

A charming timber-framed 16th Century cottage building with two downstairs bars and rooms upstairs, where bar billiards and darts can be found or where vinyl records can be played. There are benches back and front, the latter looking onto the Castle and Moat Garden. Fuller's London Pride, ESB, Dark Star Hophead and occasional guest ales are available.






13 Minutes Walk O 29-31 West Street, SG13 8F7

Established in 1817, The Black Horse is a traditional Free House with a welcoming interior and large well-kept garden, home to an impressive woodfired pizza oven. Unusually, since the 1970's it has had an RFU affiliated rugby team and is home to many local community groups. Food is locally sourced and there is a full menu of traditional meals served lunchtimes and evenings. There are six ever-changing real ales available.





In the 18th Century Ware was the leading malting town in Britain. Many of the buildings used in the industry remain in the town today, providing a striking reminder of its malting history. Situated on the River Lea, Ware became a significant crossing point for stagecoaches travelling between London and Cambridge. The High Street today is marked with many former Coaching Inns and interesting cobbled pathways leading down to the river. Another attractive feature of the town is the run of riverside gazebos built in the 18th Century. You will not see as many together elsewhere in the country.



An old-fashioned, small and friendly local's pub close to the town centre. The closest pub to the station is opposite an entrance to the New River Path which takes you into the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust nature reserve. McMullen's AK Original Mild available.



A large popular pub that serves traditional pub style food all day. A picturesque setting, with a sun trap patio that also has enclosed cabin style seating for cooler days, runs alongside the River Lea and its passing narrowboats. Eight cask ales, sometimes including one from a Herts brewer, available.

Originally a coaching inn, The Brewery Tap pub has stood in the middle of the High Street since the 15th century. Now it is a warm and friendly, busy town centre pub, with attractive courtyard seating. Inside, find the penny wall and wallpaper map depicting the local area. St Austell Tribute, Oakham Citra, Greene King Abbot & Timothy Taylor Landlord, and one guest ale available. Additionally, in a nod to their brewing history, they have their very own house beer 'Warehouse Ale'.

HERTFORD

THE OLD BULLS HEAD This attractive timbered 17th Century building marks the west of the town centre. Look out for the parliamentary clock, inglenook fireplace and list of former Ware pubs. There is a large garden and patio area. Theakston Best and Old Peculier available.

CAMRA'S South Hertfordshire Pub of the Year Silver winner in 2023. Three to four guest ales available, often with a dark beer at weekends.

EXPLORE THE NEW RIVER PATH




Nestled between Ware and St Margarets Stations, a vibrant food-led and comfortable village pub located uphill from the picturesque New River Path. Two seating areas, one opposite a beautiful ancient church. One changing cask beer available, sometimes from a Hertfordshire brewer.

St Margarets station serves the village of Stanstead Abbotts which is home to Roasted Malt Specialists, French and Jupps, maltsters since the late 1600's. The Jupp family are still involved in the company today. In the 1800's they supplied malt to Samuel Whitbread and Benjamin Truman. From 1864 onwards sites in Stanstead Abbotts were bought up and the whole enterprise moved there from the London area in 1896.



'Rye House' the name of the station, the pub, and the site of the infamous plot of 1683 to assassinate King Charles II and his brother on their way back from the Newmarket races. The Rye House plot failed when the King returned home early. The impressive Gatehouse opposite the pub is all

that remains of the original Rye House, which in its heyday, was a popular tourist spot for Londoners. In 1870, the owner, William Henry Teale, opened a pleasure garden, displaying the Great Bed of Ware, which he'd recently acquired. It was such a popular destination for excursions from London that an extra station was built on the Liverpool Street to Hertford East line to serve it.





 Rye Road, Hoddesdon, EN11 0EH The Rye House pub dates from 1756 when it was named The King's Arms. The pub was modernised in the 21st Century though the impressive large cast iron windows remain as an iconic feature of the building. A large, family friendly pub there is a well-appointed beer garden to enjoy the views of the River Lea. Traditional pub food is served daily. Greene King IPA and two changing beers are available.

Award winning New River Brewery are based close to Rye House Station. Established in 2015 on the banks of the New River, which provides the inspiration behind all their beer names. The brewery supplies many local pubs and restaurants.



Old Nazeing Road, Broxbourne, EN10 6QT The Crown Inn has served Broxbourne for several hundred years, dating back to the 1700's. It was popular with Victorian day-trippers. The current building was constructed in the 1930s. This large pub is sited on a bend of the river with a pleasant garden. To the right of the entrance is the public saloon style bar, to the left are the extensive restaurant rooms which lead onto the garden area overlooking the boat hire centre. Adnams Ghost Ship, Sharp's Doom Bar, Timothy Taylor Landlord available.



WHAT IS REAL ALE?

The Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) defines real ale, also known as cask ale, as a living product, containing brewers' yeast, that continues to ferment (or condition) in its cask as it

lies in the pub cellar. Generally, standard ingredients are malted barley, hops, water and brewers' yeast.
